#### Guide to Prayer and Study - Week of November 9-14, 2020

#### Monday, November 9

Read - Luke 10:38-42

Notice - Jesus' friend Martha was very busy with good, sensible things! She wanted to be a good host, to offer her guest a good meal and restful lodging. We, too, often feel hurried and stressed, because we're trying to do too many good (not bad) things. In Jesus' day, to "sit at someone's feet" meant becoming that person's disciple. In this story, "Martha did what the culture valued in women: cleaned the house and cooked the food. Mary did what the culture valued in men: became a disciple."\* This story would have shocked many of Luke's readers. To listen at a rabbi's feet was for the rabbi's main followers—an honor their culture kept for men. (In the first century near east it was truly thought that a women's place was "in the kitchen.") Jesus did not put down Martha's caring. He did say, "Mary has chosen the better part." As you set your priorities, how can you keep "listening to Jesus" and "sitting at his feet" a focus and priority?

**Pray** - Jesus, help me to slow down and listen to your voice today. When it comes to my priorities, show me the better part, and give me the will to follow your ways. #### Tuesday, November 10

Read - Psalm 40:1-8

Notice - "All my hope in the LORD," Psalm 40 said. Okay, we may think, I put some hope in God, maybe a lot. But there's also my job, my family ties, my retirement account.... Part of what makes the current pandemic frustrating is that it shows the fragility of so many of the human possessions and activities in which we tend to put our hope. The psalmist said it was folly to pay attention to "the proud" and "those who follow lies." Instead, the psalmist called us to celebrate God's wonderful deeds and plans. "Those who put their trust in the LORD... are truly happy," said verse 4. We're bombarded with claims that nearly anything, from whitening toothpaste to a luxury cruise to the best new smartphone, will make us truly happy. Do you believe that the source of true happiness to which Psalm 40 pointed is more credible than the ads that barrage you from all sides? In what ways have you found a greater depth of true joy and hope by trusting in God?

Pray - God, sometimes it's hard for me to look beyond today's circumstances, beyond even tomorrow's problems. Keep teaching me how to focus on your wonderful deeds and your plans for us. Amen.

#### Wednesday, November II

Read - Matthew 6:31-34

Notice - Jesus saw, as we often do not, that worry makes us focus on the wrong things. We often fixate on food, clothing, and other material goods because we fear that at some future time we might not have enough. "Desire first and foremost God's kingdom and God's righteousness," Jesus said, inviting us to trust that God really cares for us. In God's hands, he said, we are always eternally secure, through any trouble life brings. Scholar N. T. Wright said in Jesus' teaching "the point was... priorities. Put the world first, and you'll find it gets moth-eaten in your hands. Put God first, and you'll get the world thrown in.... Living totally without worry sounds, to many people, as impossible as living totally without breathing.... Here, at the heart of the Sermon on the Mount, is an invitation that surprisingly few people even try to take up."\* Are you willing to try to take up Jesus' invitation about worry?

**Pray** - Jesus, you were too aware to claim that every earthly life has a happy short-term ending. You knew a cross waited for you. And yet you spoke of peace, of not worrying. Fill me with your trusting peace in a broken world. Amen.

#### Thursday, November 12

Read - Matthew 7:1-6

**Notice** - Judging is a necessary part of life. Yet Jesus said, "Don't judge." This did not mean we should not have opinions or that we should not evaluate people's actions carefully, especially if they are harmful. It does mean that we should hold our opinions with humility and remember that we too have fallen short of how God calls us to live. Humility requires us to admit we often don't know the entire story. Ultimately God, not us, is the all-knowing judge, and justice is finally God's responsibility. (Still verse 6 made it clear that Jesus did not call anyone to be naïve or accept abusive actions.) A wise woman had to testify in court. In answer to the question, "Do you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, so help you God?" The woman humbly replied, "Your honor, I don't know the whole truth." Sometimes that uncomfortable reality is at least part of Jesus' hyperbolic "log" in your eye. What is a current tense situation that might find a better resolution if you could open yourself to look at it from a different point of view? **Pray** - Jesus, keep me healthily aware of my strengths while still being able to "take the log out of [my] eye" before trying to correct or "improve" others. Amen.

#### Friday, November 13

Read - Matthew 6:5-8

Notice -

All through Matthew 6, as Jesus taught about various spiritual practices, he never used the word "if." In today's passage, he said "When you pray..." just as in yesterday's passage he said, "when you give to the poor." As scholar N. T. Wright put it, Jesus "assumes that people will continue to do all of these. What matters is learning to do them simply to and for God himself."\* Jesus' description of people who think their prayers will be heard because they "pour out a flood of empty words" might recall the bizarre, tragic scene of the Baal prophets "praying" on Mount Carmel (cf. I Kings 18:26-29). They didn't see their god(s) as caring and loving, but as careless, aloof, and needing to be "won over." What helps you trust that God wants to hear you, that you don't need to impress God by eloquence or lengthy rhetoric?

**Pray** - Jesus, when we make it a definition, it sounds so obvious: "Prayer is talking to God." Help me keep growing so that I value talking to you more highly than any other friend to whom I talk often. Amen.

#### Saturday, November 14

Read - Acts 7:54-8:3, Acts 9:1-9, 20-22

Notice - Saul first appeared in the book of Acts as almost a bit player, a young man holding other people's coats. He quickly became a leading persecutor of early Christians. A stunning encounter with the risen Christ utterly changed his life. He soon began using his Roman name, Paul (cf. Acts 13:9). His passion and drive, formerly used in hate and harassment, now focused on proclaiming persuasively that Jesus was, in fact, the long-awaited Messiah. In Saul's upbringing, nearly everyone he valued, from the high priest down, rejected Jesus and saw Christians as a threat to God's truth. It's no wonder he worked passionately to destroy a faith he saw as dangerously wrong. In what ways did Saul have to adjust his dreams and expectations to reorder his life after meeting Jesus? Did your background and training make it easy or hard for you to believe in Jesus? What changes, if any, has your faith called you to make?

**Pray** - Jesus, you called Saul and changed his life. He went on to change millions of lives by his preaching and writing. Give me listening ears and an openness to meet you as you reach out to my heart. Amen.
